Methodological approach of WP2

The Methodological Approach employed in WP2 serves as a crucial step in establishing a solid foundation for the project's success. This data collection process involves gathering insights from young individuals aged 18 to 30 in partner countries, supplemented by real stories and examples. This comprehensive approach not only aligns with the European Union and the Council of Europe's emphasis on gender equality but also informs the development of digital tools to address discrimination, harassment, and gender equality effectively.

The methodological approach used by the involved partners in their national contexts involved narrative interviews, semi-structured questionnaire-based interviews, and surveys to gather data from a diverse group. The focus was on strategies to prevent discrimination, challenges faced, support methods, and views on existing laws, while ethical considerations such as informed consent, confidentiality, and participant well-being were prioritised.

Outcome of WP2

A key outcome of Animatopedia's endeavours is the production of National Reports, each tailored to the context of individual partner countries. These reports provide a comprehensive overview of legal frameworks, policies, and initiatives related to sex-based discrimination and harassment within each nation. Furthermore, the reports delve into the current challenges faced in addressing these issues and offer insightful recommendations for future actions.

Harassment and Sexual Harassment: Harassment, as per EU Directive 2002/73/EC, involves unwanted conduct linked to a person's sex that breaches dignity, fostering environments of intimidation, degradation, or offense. Sexual harassment entails unwelcome sexual behavior that violates dignity, particularly when creating a hostile environment.

Gender Equality: Gender equality ensures freedom for individuals of all genders and identities to pursue chosen paths, with equal opportunities and participation in



society. The EU Gender Equality Strategy 2020-2025 aims to end violence, challenge stereotypes, bridge labour gaps, and achieve gender balance.

Intersectionality: Intersectionality recognizes interconnected identities (race, gender, sexuality) shaping privilege and oppression. This perspective addresses gender-based violence and discrimination within complex systemic structures.

Youth Violence: Youth violence spans psychological, verbal, and physical aggression to severe outcomes, including murder. Acts may target individuals, animals, or objects, influenced by multifaceted concauses.

Gender-Based Violence Definitions: Gender-based violence, rooted in gender inequality, targets individuals based on gender, predominantly affecting women and girls. Forms include physical, sexual, psychological, and economic harm.

Third-Wave Feminism and Intersectionality: Third-wave feminism emphasises inclusive approaches, considering diverse women's experiences, while intersectionality recognizes identities' interaction and their influence on discrimination and harassment.

Analysis of the specific national contexts: A summary

Gender equality, sex-based discrimination, sexual harassment, and related issues are significant concerns across Portugal, Cyprus, Italy, and Belgium. While each country has its unique context, the Comprehensive Report shows that they share common challenges and efforts to promote gender equality.

In all countries, the call for education, awareness, support, and policy changes to combat sex-based discrimination and harassment was prominent. The role of digital tools was recognized, but their effective use requires more focused efforts. The collective insights from these results underscore the need for multi-faceted strategies involving education, legal frameworks, cultural shifts, and the power of digital platforms to create lasting change in the lives of young people.
